Pollution Solution

Plant a tree

Trees turn harmful carbon dioxide into oxygen, cool down our homes in summer, and protect our homes from cold winter

Grow your own garden

Plants absorb carbon dioxide and produce oxygen. They provide habitats and prevent erosion.

Start to compost

Composting cuts greenhouse gases and diverts unwanted organic material from landfills.

Use a rake instead of a leaf blower

A rake doesn't emit engine exhaust like a gas-powered blower.

Turn off the lights

Power plants use fossil fuels to generate electricity and fossil fuels contribute to air pollution. Turn off the lights to save energy and reduce the demand for electricity.

Fill up the dishwasher

The EPA and the University of Texas have shown that dishwashers are greatest source of indoor air pollution. Make sure the dishwasher is full before turning it on.

Recycle and re-use paper

Most paper ends up in landfills where it decomposes and produces methane gas which is 20x more potent that carbon dioxide. Re-use paper bags. Print on both sides of a sheet of paper.

Avoid plastics – bags, straws, utensils Made from chemicals that

contaminate the air, plastics never disappear even when they are thrown away. Plastics are an environmental menace. Use eco-friendly straws, utensils, and bottles.
